This term KS1 have received visits from many people who help us: dentists, vicars, postwomen, nurses and policemen have all popped in to talk to the children about their jobs although the highlight was most definitely the visit from a paramedic and his ambulance. The siren turned many a head both at school and in the village and the children had the opportunity to explore in side, sit in the driver's seat, measure their heart rates and try out the stretcher. Our school choir performed three pieces by Benjamin Britten as part of the opera which included a professional orchestra and opera singers. 14 children have also started to play the violin and viola this term. We were incredibly fortunate to have been bought 14 instruments which will make music teaching sustainable at school. Last Friday a string quartet from Snape Maltings played for pupils and parents in our Celebration Assembly – a fantastic introduction to classical music.

This term the Governors have spent a morning in school monitoring Marking and Feedback and Handwriting. As well as looking at books, they spent time talking to our pupils who proudly told them about our new handwriting scheme LetterJoin and showing them their cursive script. The children also explained how feedback is given to them by the teachers and how and when they do their response marking.

The term has ended calmly but with everyone in the festive spirit. After school on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> December many of our pupils and parents joined teachers and members of the community for the All Saints Christmas Tree Festival. It was a magical service in our little church surrounded by many trees decorated by members of the parish, including our school tree. Our school choir sang beautifully. This week KS1 will be performing their Nativity which promises to be a show stopper – Lights, Camel, Action tells the Christmas story from the perspective of a camel.
