



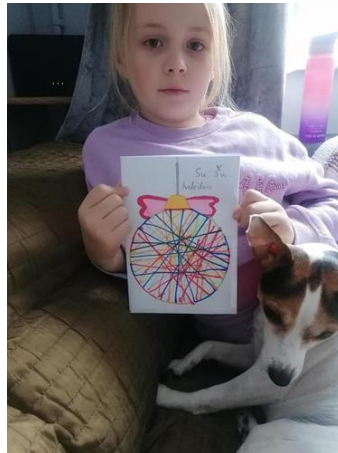
At All Saints' CE Primary, we are 'Children of God'. We wear our crowns with pride. Together we are Included, Involved and Inspired.



Over this academic year, Year 3 are developing their leadership roles and thinking about how their actions can have a positive effect on the school and wider communities. This is providing a great opportunity for children to develop skills for the future and to begin to understand how we all have a role to play to make our world a better place.



Year 3 are completing the Archbishop of York's Young Leaders Award. The children join Archie as he discovers that he can 'be the change he wants to see' in his community. The children have been exploring what it means to be a leader, investigate inspirational leaders and their impact, identify actions within the local, national and global communities.



To kick start the project, the children have been taking on personal challenges and think about how their actions can have a positive impact on their school, home and local community. The children have started to complete Archie's Challenge Grid which includes actions such as offering to do the dishes at home.

One of Archie's challenges was to 'write a thank you card to someone who helps the community'. Year 3 decided to take on this challenge as a whole class. They choose doctors and nurses who were working in A&E department over the Christmas holidays. The children created individual thank you messages to create a big card. They also organised a collection of treats for the staff. A selection of children then delivered the card and gift to West Suffolk Hospital via the My Wish charity. The children were greeted by members of the charity and some nurses from A&E. They found out about what the doctors and nurses do in A&E and how it was open 24 hours a day. The staff were very grateful and enjoyed meeting the children. The children then shared their experience with the rest of the class.

This was a great opportunity for children to realise how their actions could really make a difference in their local community.



The children also presented their project (so far) to the whole school in collective worship. They were able to explain what skills they thought a good leader should have and how small actions can make such an impact.



Year 3 talked about how EVERYONE 'can be the change they want to see'. This is very true for one of our Year 6 children who has raised £1,000 to help protect endangered habitats around the world by running over 14 marathons. We are really proud of how our All Saints' children are making such a difference in the world.
