KS1 Spring Walk to Pin Mill

As we are close to the River Orwell, all our classes are named after river barges, that helped carry goods to Ipswich docks. Cygnets class joined Melissa class for a local walk. The children enjoyed walking past diggers on a building site, seeing sheep in a field, listening to different bird calls, exploring the woods and having a break on Pin Mill green, looking out over the boats and river. On the way, they found lots of signs of Spring such as daffodils, buds, new leaves and blossoms. They also spent some time using magnifying glasses in the woods to examine different microhabitats such as logs, soil and leaves, finding lots of minibeasts living in the different areas.



It was heart-warming to see how excited the children were by noticing all the wonder around them. Their curiosity was matched by their respect and care for all the living things that they found. It is clear to see how beneficial their Chelmondiston Forest Schools experience is in their outlook and response to the natural world. RE in Lower KS2

In Religious Education the children have been learning about the Kingdom of God and what this means to Christians. This has involved reading different parables that Jesus told in order to spread the word of God, and discovering and discussing the morals taught within and how we can apply these in our own lives. By studying the Lord's Prayer and reflecting on its meaning, the children have learnt how following these teachings is fundamental to understanding what the Kingdom of God is and how Christians can live their lives accordingly. The children have also been studying Holy Week and what each day in the week leading up to Easter Sunday represents and why the cross is such a significant symbol to Christians.

Science in KS2



Thistle class has been investigating the properties of materials in Science by performing a number of investigations. They identified that some solids are soluble in water by exploring how different sugars dissolve. By accurately timing their experiment, they used their collected data to create graphs to visualise their results. Building upon this, they also identified that some solids are insoluble. They were given the task to separate seawater (a solution of water, salt and sand). Through experimentation, they identified that to separate the sand they could use the process of filtration and to separate the salt they could evaporate the water by using heat.



Flavour filled the classroom as Thistle class cooked a delicious spaghetti bolognese. The chefs firstly identified the ingredients required for the dish before preparing them using a range of techniques. The class has promised that they are going to cook this at home in the near future! Not only did they learn how to cook this delectable dish, but they also had the opportunity to express their creativity by designing their own personalised jars to store the sauce.

Y6 pupils have spent focused time on turning their steady hand game designs into a high-quality finished product that can be played and enjoyed by their peers. To complete this project, the children have applied their knowledge of electrical circuits and components. Though for some, this process involved a number of challenges to overcome, the children impressed us enormously with their camaraderie and readiness to help one another to be successful in this endeavour.
